Someone to send your card to. If you took part in the Special Delivery sessions you will have received some large envelopes for sending on your postcards.



## **1** Lynn's postcards



Where did the baby's teeth go?




Do sticky burrs make you itch?

# **3** Tips for writing postcards

- You don't have to write loads-sometimes a simple 'hello' is all you need to get started.
- It may seem strange to write to someone you've never met-but that's the joy of it-you can tell them anything BUT ...
- Don't tell people stuff you don't want them to know.
- Don't worry about keeping it neat-this is a different sort of writing, and any style goes, just try and write so the other person can read it.

## **4 Tips for collaging postcards**

Once you've written your message it's time to start making your beautiful collaged postcard; here are a few tips, to get you started. Remember–your postcard can be a picture, a pattern, a celebration of your favourite colours or a collection of decorated circles–it's your choice.

Just a few lines can be very expressive



You could use coloured card, or the pens to draw faces

Whether it's a sentence or just a few random words, putting text on the card makes a big impact

REMEMBER: There's no right or wrong, it's what you want to make it, so just have fun

You could draw a border around the card, or make one out of strips of coloured paper
